Workshop 1 (10 min) "A-G Requirements for High School Students"

To enter our Cal-State or University of California schools a high school student must complete their A-G requirements to at least qualify for entrance to these schools as an incoming freshman. There is a strong percentage of students who do not know this or who have not been properly informed on these requirements. This workshop covers

these requirements and will be presented in a form for our students to understand. This workshop is important as it will make our students aware of these requirements and will hopefully trigger questions which they may ask their counselors. **SDSU Library**

One of the main focal points of the university (college) setting is the campus library. Like death and taxes every student will end up here for research assignments or to study. The Library can be formidable as it appears to be complicated with the extensive cataloging system that no one really understands. We want to make sure the students overcome this fear and gear them towards the idea of using the library for their academic pursuit. To do this we will take the students to the campus Library and give a methodology exercise with the aid of our college mentors. We will use this exercise to familiarize them with the library, to give them some methodology research skills and to have the mentor interact with the students on a topic that is relevant to our community.

This topic will act as a theme for the remainder of the semester and we will analyze a recent issue that has developed in Indian Country that will allow the student the ability to analyze the reasons why we have protections within this area.
