Introductions: A quick go around to get familiar with each other.

Teamwork Exercise: Our last time we will put you through this but we want to interact with the students to become familiar with each other.

Workshop: Degrees: “*What they are and steps to get them*”

It is important that a student know the game of college. We use that term "game" only because it fits into the scheme of a game plan. For instance, when you play a game you must know the rules and how to succeed in it. Once you know all that, then you form your game plan.

In college if you do not know the basic concepts of what a degree is, what it means, and steps to get one then you don't know the rules of the game and you can't form a game plan. This is the start of knowing the college game.

This workshop will introduce the levels within college (Freshman-Seniors) and define what a degree is, such as BA/BS.

Movie: Take-over of Alcatraz

This is the start of our research and film project. Why was “Alcatraz” taken-over and what was the legal issue that underlined the take-over?

Many times environmental agencies look to American Indian Cultural sites to stop environmental destruction. Research this to find out how this works.

Introductions: Brief introductions

Workshop: Talking with the MAN (or woman)!! “*Talking with the professor and counselors*”

One thing that most people never do is, discuss with a professor or counselor their situation or understanding of the class or what they need to do to graduate. It is rare that a instructor will actively try to engage the class (especially in the sciences). Therefore, students have to draw them out make them work for their pay. I disagree that a teacher should be hard, they are paid by the students to learn, therefore, they should be available to the student. Same stance on counselors-you paid to go to the school-the school now works for the student-but the student must be proactive in this. This is a discussion on how important it is to talk with your professors and counselors.

Presentation and theater: (Presentation by graduate students from University Theater Department)

Presentation skills are important on how people perceive you (especially if you are going to make a movie-ha). Therefore, we have asked the University Theater Department to help us develop a guide on how to present yourself on the podium and in our movie. This will also introduce a little known degree in Theater Arts that most universities have. Remember there are a number of areas in which you can obtain a degree in, college is not just Sciences and English.

This scene will discuss the students aim to take over a plot of land and tie themselves to some of the landmarks that make up the area. While preparing to do this they are confronted by the strange man who states that they are on his family grave site. The students did not know but learn that the area was once part of a village which was removed so that no Indians would live within the city. The tribe was placed some 20 miles north.

Students discuss this with the instructor who in turn brings in attorneys from a local Indian Legal program and tell them about Alcatraz and the possible discussion of how they can preserve the lands and give them back to the tribe

The local tribal member is happy with a possible solution to the problem and the tribe, students, and environmentalist seek to stop the drilling.
