AIR Fall 2010 Complete and preparing for Spring 2011

(SAN DIEGO) We have completed our Fall 2010 program with great success as we have had over 25 participants in our programs (tutorial and AIR Sr.). Along with our traditional series of projects

within our program, we tackled issues on “*Hate Speech*” and “*Environmental Racism*”. Although difficult topics, it was exciting to hear our students discuss these topics and finding that our students knew a great deal on each topic. Drawing from both their research and their own experiences our students were able to pursue each topic with greater understanding by applying their knowledge of our community. Guidance from our mentors helped our students pull together impressive presentations (even though their time in our program was brief).

Overall, we had a very successful year, expanding our program to include our three San Diego based universities (San Diego State University, the University of San Diego, and the University of California, San Diego) and having had tremendous support from all three schools. We cannot express how appreciative we are of each school as are providing more support for Native students. Although one can find that greater parity for Native students is needed, we believe that our partnered universities are advancing in the right direction.

We are grateful that Chancellor Fox came to our meeting taking time to welcome our students at UCSD. We are proud that the Office of the President at SDSU has been meeting with us and providing their support. We are truly grateful that USD has been sponsoring both our tutorial and AIR Sr. programs. With the completion of this semester we now look to our eighteenth year in operation with great optimism. We survived on our usual shoestring budgets and are thankful to all those who contributed to our program to support our students. As mentioned so many times before, our mentors and staff are all volunteers that have great dedication to our community and we cannot express how they truly make our program successful. 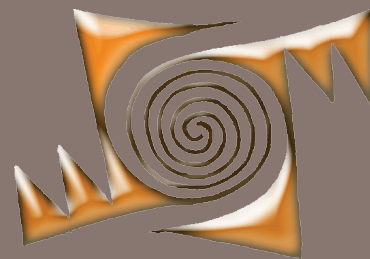
AIR Students enter College: Our Spring students (2010) have now entered Stanford University, Cal State San Marcos, and Palomar College this last Fall.
