SAN DIEGO, California — The AIR Summer program is ready to begin! This summer we intend to learn more about our Native cultures by examining the Kumeyaay and their rich history within the San Diego region. By pursuing our education on local

cultures we also intend to use this as a basis for researching our collective unique American Indian cultures.

By understanding different Native cultures we can draw parallels to our own cultures for an enriched learning experience. As an example; there are reasons why the Kumeyaay people migrated within this region as it is rich in ample food supply and has a climate that is favorable most of the year. Other tribes may be sedentary, meaning they lived in permanent villages and therefore their cultural beliefs and customs will be shaped differently based on such a lifestyle. Understanding these differences will give us a greater appreciation and understanding of our own cultures along with becoming knowledgeable on the San Diego region we all live in.

Our schedule is packed with many activities that help us understand the concepts that define a culture and those that we can use to understand our own Native cultures. We also plan to have a great time learning about each other; with many American Indian nations being represented, and having a variety of activities that will contribute to our research and having fun at the same time. Newsletter where she shared her aspirations in pursuing higher education. Since then she has contacted UCLA and won this grant!

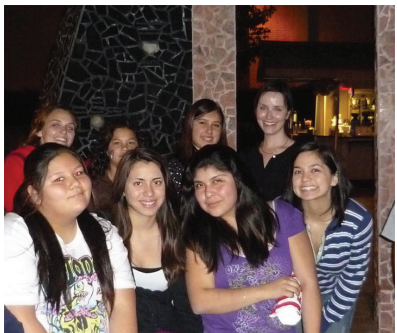

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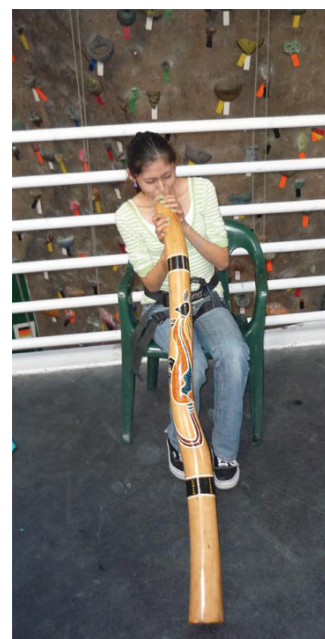
